Forever Families Through Adoption Joyfully Make Their First Baby Announcements

Joy and Michael Goldstein, the founders of Forever Families. Through Adoption, Inc. (FTA), a newly authorized New York and Connecticut not for profit adoption placement agency, are please to announce the successful placements of their first two infants.

Baby girls Bo Marie and Shantee both found homes in the Netherlands with same sex couples anxious to begin their families. Both babies were born in late June, but medical issues kept each of them from going home with their new families until just a couple of weeks ago.

"Everyone is doing well enthused Joy Goldstein, FFTA's Executive Director. "Michael and I have been truly blessed by the long and strong relationships we have formed with both the Dutch Ministry of Justice and the ever expanding group of families in the Netherlands who have worked with us to build their forever families."

The Goldstein's unusual expertise in 'reverse commute adoptions' in which an American baby is placed with an adopting family overseas, began more than 10 years ago, when a Dutch family, living temporarily in New York City while assigned to the UN

contacted Michael to help them adopt a baby. There successful experience led them to spread the word on their return to the Now there are Netherlands. dozens of "Goldsteiner" families, as they call themselves, throughout the country, raising more than 65 adopted children. There is even an annual "Goldsteiner Day" celebration, organized by the families each June. Last year, forty adopting families came to the picnic to reintroduce their growing children to Joy and Michael who were in attendance.

"Joy and I have dedicated our lives to helping birth parents, adoptive parents and, or course, children," explained Michael. "And while most of the babies we help place are healthy, Caucasian infants, we have a particular fondness for hard to place children, including those that have been drug or alcohol exposed, or who are black or bi-racial. A reverse commute adoption is often the best and many times the only alternative for these babies."

"Both Bo and Shantee are products of very difficult situations, and we know that each is likely to require the kinds of extra support in the future that the Dutch system provides," Michael added. That support includes not only free medical care and services, but a culture that turns a blind eye to racial differences.

And, of course, the support of other "Goldsteiners". "What started out as an informal support group has turned into a real community of adoptive parents and children who rely on each other for not only support, but love and friendship," said Odette, one of the picnic's organizers. "My husband and I feel that we owe the Goldstein's not just for our forever family, but for many of our forever friendships, as well."

FFTA is a New York and Connecticut authorized, not for profit, adoption placement agency founded on the belief that every child has the right to grow up in a loving, nurturing, secure, and forever home. Joy Goldstein is a Licensed Clinical Social Worker who counsels birth and adoptive parents and frequently lectures on adoption topics.
